

My CIGRE Journey (to date)

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CIGRE Association - It all began in 1999..

16 years of association with CIGRE (to date) and building....

- In 1999, I started as a member of CIGRE AP B5 (Protection and Substation Automation)
- In 2004/05, I joined CIGRE AP A3 (High Voltage Equipment) and since 2008, I have been the convenor of AP A3 and an Australian representative on SC A3
- I am a member of A3 Advisory Group, A3 Tutorial Group and am one of the authors for the "A3 Green Book"
- I have been a special reporter at CIGRE Paris Session and other CIGRE Colloquium/ Conferences
- I have contributed (as presenter/ participant/ as a member of coordination group) for numerous CIGRE events nationally and internationally
- I have been a corresponding member on two working groups (one each with B5 and A3)
- Since 2011, I am the convenor for WG A3.29: Detection and Mitigation of Aging High Voltage Equipment – brochure planned to be delivered in 2016



CIGRE A3 has grown during my time...

CIGRE A3 has seen key advances over past 8-10 years

- Expansion of scope from traditional switching technologies to other high voltage equipment (instrument transformers, surge arrestors, capacitors)
- Work on UHV (>800kV)
- Inclusion of DC switching and other DC high voltage equipment
- Shift towards asset management of high voltage equipment rather than just technology aspects — e.g. reliability survey, management of ageing high voltage equipment
- Improving its focus on medium voltage high voltage equipment



CIGRE AP A3....

A closely knit group delivering exceptional value to its members

- Has active Australian and New Zealand membership mix of utility, manufacturers and consultants
- Every year we formally share our experiences of past years (technology and management policies, technological advances, technological and asset management challenges, major failure incidents)
- Encouraging young engineers through "minutes taker at annual meeting" and more recently introduced the concept of "shadow members"
- Open half day for host organisation for annual meeting
- We have initiated the concept of preferential subjects at national level to get more interest in things that matter most to our local industry





The Good...



- Championship at the organisation level is very crucial
 - Works very well with support from your organisation and your work colleagues – as CIGRE work should relate to reality on the ground
 - Organisational leaders need to believe in CIGRE <u>and</u> be representatives themselves at CIGRE – this gives them a unique "steering" power...
- Picking topics of local interest and pursuing them gets the best support
- ANZ has a unique positioning, the skills and talent, including industry expertise on some topics is very high – and of key international significance
- Introduction of collaborative tools is excellent !!
- Recent efforts on branding are encouraging (and go beyond the feedback I have from other national committees) !!



The Challenges...



- A lot of work at CIGRE AP A3 internationally is not entirely relevant to ANZ...
- Work at CIGRE is seen as a "cost" and an "overhead" and with growing financial constraints - active representation is diminishing/likely to diminish (including effects of brain drain)..
- University representation is diminishing... almost nil for AP A3
- Representation of utility/ manufacturing "active leadership" team is reducing
- Association with technical regulators is a gap that should be addressed sooner
- The panel members don't have the bandwidth to spread the brand they are loaded with technical matter and don't have the time/ expertise to deal with organisation level communication
- For many panel members association is limited to the time they are on the panel/ as a convenor
- In my experience, our membership organisations do not "actively" approach us to provide advise/ undertake key research on topics of our scope

Does any other National Committee come any closer?

- We are leading the way we deal with CIGRE Nationally...
- We are leading the way we represent at CIGRE SC Internationally
- We are leading the way we interact (confluence, branding...)
- We have our own challenges (funding, comparative size of network)....
- We need to find a way to continue to find ways to both sustain and enhance our positioning at CIGRE Internationally....





Some Observations & Recommendations

We can continue to enhance CIGRE Australia's standing...

- Work with local industry partners more actively by being seen as an "organisation to go to" for technical matters related to electricity industry...
 - Make the leaders of key organisations integral to our operations...
 - We need to be seen as a part of them rather than a service provider
 - Look at developing a executive management level and CIGRE technical work level champion at each key member organisation
- Recognise the synergies between some CIGRE Panels and collaborate between these panels to create national/ Australasian events that can be sustained (leverage on SEAPAC experience, emerging Techcon) – in essence create a recurring calendar of events with a deeper value add....
- Develop ways to ensure that the active members on our panels see a long standing association with CIGRE – not merely as AP Convenors but as industry experts
- Look at alternative options to see a longer standing at some of the key (with deeper local interest) CIGRE SC's and lead the way...
- Have an active curriculum of topics (e.g. list of tutorials that we can provide tailored to the organisational needs) that we can impart to the local industry on their door steps as opposed to conferences that entail travel costs – this will enable member organisations to engage, harness value

The journey has a long way to go...

- My time at CIGRE has been the same as the time with my wife

- Range of topics for further work are emanating from the working group that I convene and these are highly relevant to the local industry in current financially constrained economically regulated industry (managing ageing high voltage equipment will continue to remain a challenge!).
